This has been a wonderful year of growth for the Library. I have now completed an exciting full first year in Highwood after coming on board in February 2019. During this past year, I enjoyed meeting the community, launching new partnerships, collaborating with local organizations and businesses, trying out all the delicious restaurants in town, and learning what makes this city great.

Of any institution, libraries are our best hope for full community inclusivity. They allow everyone, men, women, and children, regardless of ethnicity, income, language, gender, or age, to have access to the wide world of knowledge in a "judgement-free" zone.

Highwood is a diverse community with unique needs, based on multiculturalism and the prevalence of trade skill jobs, such as our thriving culinary scene. And the library has become an asset to our diverse community and their successful futures by offering free and inclusive literacy programs, learning resources, and fun.

In this past year, we have seen many success stories come out of our programs and services. This year, we have 26 students in our GED class, and five are only one test away from obtaining their

GED. We also have many students working towards becoming naturalized United States citizens, and in February, one student passed the test to become a U.S. citizen and was excited to vote for the very first time in the primaries. We also launched a successful 2020 Census campaign, in partnership with the City of Highwood, RAILS, and IDHS, to communicate the importance of the Census for our community, especially the hard-to-count population.

The Library's team is committed to exploring new worlds through our collections and programs. My top priority is to maintain the outstanding library services the community has grown to expect, while offering even more impactful programming and resources that improve and transform lives. We hope to continue being a trusted third place where everyone can feel comfortable to exchange ideas, enjoy free time, and build relationships.

This year has demonstrated the impact that the Highwood Public Library has on the community it serves. We will continue to be here for you, as we have been for over 40 years, as always, ready to adapt to your needs, your wants, and your futures.

### THE FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY

For the first time in the Library's history, a 501(c)(3) status was successfully implemented to create a fundraising arm of the Library via the Friends of the Highwood Public Library group.

Within this past first year, the Friends recruited eight board members and finalized their mission statement and logo. They set up Quickbooks to track financial information, Little Green Light to track donor information, Google documents for internal communication, and Facebook and LinkedIn pages to spread awareness.

Currently, the Friends group has raised over \$97,000 for the Highwood Public Library. This money was raised via memberships, individual donors, grants, and book sales. Using mostly personal contacts in their fundraising efforts, they also hosted a two-day book sale and have permanent books for sale in the Library and at Beermiscuous, a local beer cafe.

Looking ahead to the next year, the Friends will be transitioning into the next phase of their fundraising strategy, which includes finalizing their website, their fundraising literature, and purchasing marketing material. They will be working on a general mailing to all Highwood residents, business/corporation sponsorships, and the Highwood Public Library's capital campaign.
